Julie Houston Elmer

Julie Houston Elmer, age 69 of Birmingham, AL, went peacefully to be with Jesus on October 22, 2024. Julie was born in Anniston, AL, and raised in Chulafinnee, AL, by her late parents, Charles and Bettie Houston. She was married to Dr. Ken Elmer for 41 years. She graduated from Jacksonville State University as a first-generation college student with a degree in political science, and she was crowned Miss Alabama in 1977, going on to represent the state of Alabama in the 1978 Miss America Pageant.

After college, Julie became a senate aide in Washington, D.C. She eventually returned to Alabama, where she met her husband, Ken, during rehearsals for the 1982 Miss Alabama pageant, bonding over their shared love of music. They married in 1983, between Ken finishing medical school at the University of Alabama, Birmingham, and starting his pediatric residency. Julie worked in radio advertising for Birmingham's WQEZ and then Magic 96 until becoming a mother in 1985. She then dedicated all her time and effort to investing in the lives of their three children.

As a mother, Julie was the ultimate cheerleader and a constant source of encouragement. Even now, friends fondly remember Julie's hospitality and household as a warm, welcoming place, always stocked with ice cream and her famous chocolate chip cookies. She and Ken were actively involved at Briarwood Presbyterian Church, serving together in the choir and praise team. After her children graduated from high school, she took on the full-time role of Briarwood's Women's Ministry Coordinator, a position she cherished for 10 years until her retirement in 2016.

Julie loved Jesus more than anything, and the way she chose to spend her time reflected this love. A gifted musician, she was always ready to sing a gospel hymn or accompany someone on the piano. In her spare time, Julie served as an assistant teaching director in Community Bible Study, where she led music, prepared and delivered biblical studies, trained leaders, and supported the spiritual growth of women in Birmingham. Even in retirement, during her battle with early-onset Alzheimer's disease, she arranged and delivered flowers through Briarwood's L.O.V.E. Ministries and volunteered at Restoration Academy, reading to children. Above all, she wanted her life to reflect the love of her Savior.

After nearly a decade of walking alongside her on the hard road of memory loss, Julie's family rejoices in the promises of 2 Corinthians 5:17: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come." This was the story of her salvation, and they find comfort in knowing that Julie is now fully restored and with her Lord.

The family also expresses sincere gratitude for the years of loving support from friends and family during this difficult season, and to the Kingdom Builders Sunday School class, who brought weekly meals to the family for many years. The Elmers also extend their deepest appreciation to Gayle Griffith, who dedicated her days to being Julie's constant companion and caretaker. Gayle's unwavering love provided Julie with comfort and joy during her final years.

"His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master." Matthew 25:21

On October 22nd Jesus spoke those words face to face to His faithful servant, Julie Elmer, as she entered into eternal joy. What a glorious thing! Faithful servant is a very fitting description of her. In all seasons and callings (wife, mother, friend, Bible teacher, praise leader, women's ministry director, etc.) she humbly trusted God to work in and through her. Even in the ravages of dementia her love for Jesus shone brightly.

In 2006, after a season of being a stay-at-home mom, she became the women's ministry director at Briarwood. I can't exactly remember how it happened, but I started volunteering and she asked me to be on her women's leadership team. We became fast friends. She was such a special person; how could I not want to be her friend?! God equipped her with a perfect balance of being a "people person" and a "task person." She could get things done and at the same time make those around her feel special. To the casual observer she appeared calm and gracious, always available to listen and encourage, even when the tasks of the ministry were pressing in on her. Those of us with behind-the-scene knowledge were usually freaking out with all the details, but her firm belief that "He who called you will do it" made her a peace-filled, confident leader. In everything, her goal was to glorify God, present the Gospel to the lost, and encourage, train, and challenge her sisters in Christ. Every single event. Every single encounter.

As an added bonus, Julie was fun, always quick to laugh and entertain. For years, she and her husband Ken, along with Tammy and Matt Moore, were well-known at Briarwood for their funny skits and songs. For her first ladies' retreat as director, she recruited the group to perform a few songs as "The Supremes." They brought the house down not only with their talented performance but also with their beautiful (and hilarious) costumes. You haven't lived until you've seen Ken and Matt in Diana Ross wigs and red sequined evening gowns. Only Julie Elmer could have pulled that off and gotten away with it. Thankfully for the guys, there is no video evidence. It was before everyone had camaras on their phones. And I think the photos were confiscated.

Her memorial service was such a special time of remembering her life. I encourage you to go to the Briarwood Facebook page and watch it. You will be encouraged and challenged as I was. Hebrews 12:1 tells us that we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses. Julie is among those now. She has completed her race, passed the torch, and is cheering us on from the celestial sidelines (not sure how that works theologically). With endurance and eyes fixed on Jesus, we are still running our own God-ordained races with the goal of hearing "Well done, good and faithful servant." Thank you, Julie, for leading the way so well. We miss you. See you soon.

FOUNDATIONS

This Fall I have asked Cathe Cleveland to share with us about four non-negotiables for us as believers. These are four bedrock truths that our women's ministry will continue to reinforce throughout the Fall and into the new year. I pray you will be both encouraged and challenged as you consider these truths.

In the last two newsletters, we talked a little about the first two of four non-negotiable principles that flow from Covenant Theology and frame the way we think biblically and live covenantally. This month we look at the third.

Here are all four:

- 1. God is our reference point.
- 2. His Word is our authority.
- 3. His glory is our purpose.
- 4. His presence is His promise.

His Glory is Our Purpose

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble at its swelling. (Psalm 46:1–3 ESV)

Trying to continue to have civil conversations with people I know and love who are on all sides of the issues dividing our nation and the world in the fall of 2024 has driven me to spend a good bit of time meditating on Psalm 46. These opening verses talk about how God, as our refuge and strength, is far more secure and unchanging than even the mountains and the ground beneath our feet. The writer probably did this in part because we tend to think of mountains as beautiful, majestic, and unchanging.

I have always loved being in the mountains. I grew up in Oklahoma where it is relatively flat, but our family spent a few childhood vacations in Colorado. Even as a child, the majestic beauty of driving along Trail Ridge Road and other places in the Rockies made a lasting impression. When someone loves being in the mountains, whenever they speak of them their appreciation for the beauty and majesty naturally overflows. And there are always stories of hiking adventures and perfect sunrises. And, oh, the pictures that could be shared!

Mountains seem so permanent. But the truth is that once mountains form, they immediately begin a process of very slowly but very constantly eroding. The roots of even very small plants along with the freezing and thawing of water crack even the largest rocks and eventually break them down into soil. The nature of things is that mountains are constantly losing height as rocks and soil are continually pulled downhill by gravity and the runoff of rain and melting snow.

This year we witnessed this process in a sudden, violent, more obvious way in North Carolina and neighboring states. Hurricane Helene brought unprecedented amounts of rain in the Appalachians in a very short period of time. We saw vivid videos of the tragic mudslides that took many lives, homes, businesses, and memories.

Life will never be the same for the survivors as they work to rebuild. Never again will they be lulled into trusting the ground as being solid and permanent. Now they understand even better the true nature of mountains in a fallen world with their beauty and the potential for destruction in a moment. I am sure the way they speak about life in the mountains will be forever changed and probably truer to reality in some ways. Hopefully their experience will also help the believers among them to have a clearer understanding of God that is truer to reality. Surely they have a deeper understanding of those words in Psalm 46.

The final verses of the Psalm remind us of where our confidence belongs so that it can never be shaken: *"Be still, and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth! The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress."* (Psalm 46:10–11)

Psalm 46 is only one of many places in Scripture that we are assured that God's glory will be proclaimed throughout the whole earth. (See also: Numbers 14:21, Habakkuk 2:14, Isaiah 9:11, Psalm 72:19.) As a matter of fact, Question 1 of the *Westminster Confession* points out that that glorifying the Lord is our very purpose for being on earth: "What is the chief and highest end of man?" And the answer with the scriptural proofs given is "Man's chief and highest end is to glorify God, (Rom. 11:36, 1 Cor. 10:31) and fully to enjoy him forever. (Ps. 73:24–28, John 17:21–23)" In other words, **God's glory is our purpose**. If glorifying God is the purpose we are here on earth, it begs the question, what does it mean to glorify the Lord? Scripture brings some clarity.

1. We speak of His glory

"I will bless the LORD at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul makes its boast in the LORD; let the humble hear and be glad. Oh, magnify the LORD with me, and let us exalt his name together!" (Psalm 34:1–3)

It could be said that the person who loves mountains and speaks of their majesty to others is reflecting some of the "glory" or majesty of those mountains to others. While that is only a small shadow of what it means to glorify the only One who is truly glorious, it points to the idea that a big part of glorifying the Lord is related to how we speak about Him. We should speak well and knowledgably of Him and His greatness. We should speak clearly about the fact that we have nothing to boast in ourselves, but any boasting we do should be about the greatness of our God:

2. Everything we do should glorify Him

"So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." (1 Corinthians 10:31)

The scope of how we glorify the Lord is much bigger than speech alone. *Everything* we do should be in accord with what He has revealed to us in His Word about what is true, and beautiful, and good. We should act in such a way that when others see our behavior it would reflect positively on the reputation of our Lord and Savior.

3. Our actions should flow from confident faith

Additionally, as we saw in the closing verses of Psalm 46 above, our actions must be accompanied by confident faith, that we "Be still and know" God as He really is.

4. He WILL be glorified throughout the earth

As we glorify the Lord, we may be limited in our effectiveness in any area where we misrepresent who He truly is. We should actively seek to more deeply comprehend all His attributes so that we confidently show everyone that He is truly worthy of more praise than we could ever give. But we can be 100% confident that He *will* be exalted among the nations of the world and that does *not* depend on how effective we are at glorifying Him. But when we truly know Him for who He really is, we will realize it is a gracious privilege that He allows us to have *any* part in glorifying Him.

It leads us to doxology as Paul leads us in the closing verses of Romans 11:

"Oh, the depth of the riches and wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are his judgments and how inscrutable his ways! "For who has known the mind of the Lord, or who has been his counselor?" "Or who has given a gift to him that he might be repaid?" For from him and through him and to him are all things. To him be glory forever. Amen." (Romans 11:33–36)

Let us continually join together to lift up His great name!

"Oh, magnify the LORD with me, and let us exalt his name together!" (Psalm 34:3)




