FOUNDATIONS

In the last three newsletters, we talked a little about the first three of four non-negotiable principles that flow from Covenant Theology and frame the way we think biblically and live covenantally. This month we look at the fourth and final one. Think of these four principles as four sides of a picture frame that keep us on track as we seek to stay "on message — on mission — in ministry."

Here are all four:

God is our reference point. His Word is our authority. His glory is our purpose. His presence is His promise.

His Presence is His Promise

It is not good to be alone. We know this is true from experience. Even when you are in a crowd, you can feel very alone whenever you do not know of at least one other person there who feels what you are feeling. It can also happen when you feel the pain of loss after you are separated from someone geographically, relationally, or through death. We can all attest to the fact that it is never good to feel like you are the "other." In Genesis loneliness was the first thing at creation that God said was not good:

Then the LORD God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him. (Genesis 2:18 ESV)

God saw loneliness and immediately made a remedy for it. Prior to the fall, the man and woman dwelt with God in the garden He had designed for them. After the fall we hear about their very tangible encounter with His presence after they realized their sin:

And they heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden. (Genesis 3:8 ESV)

Imagine hearing the LORD God walking in your home—being in the very presence of God. The truth is that He provided an even greater solution to loneliness. Christianity is unique among world religions because it alone teaches that God chooses to dwell with His people. It is one of the great themes that unfolds throughout Scripture and the story of His fulfilling that promise from runs Genesis to Revelation. Once the pattern is recognized, we start seeing hints and shadows of God's presence with His people everywhere in Scripture. Here are six big ones that you can think of as a kind of hatrack that you can hang others on to help you recognize and organize them.

The Garden—The First Sanctuary

This was the starting place for the development of God's covenant promise to dwell among His people. Adam and Eve dwelt in God's presence but after the fall they were driven from the Garden. His presence cannot tolerate sin's presence. (Genesis 1–3) But He also begins unfolding His promise of making a way to be present with His people beginning in Genesis 3:15 and further through Abraham.

The Tabernacle—The Exodus Sanctuary

God met with Moses at Mt. Sinai and the glory cloud was the visible manifestation of God's presence. Moses was on the mountain for forty days as God instructed him with great detail on how the Israelites were to build and furnish the tabernacle, and what were to be the responsibilities of the priests that ministered there. Exodus 24–31 records the intricate details. The tabernacle was to be placed in the center of the camp where it would be a constant reminder of the glory and majesty of God. That God would dwell in the midst of His people would not be something to be taken lightly.

The closing chapters of Exodus cover the construction of the tabernacle and so there could be no question of the presence of God, chapter 40 closes with a description of the glory cloud covering the tabernacle, and how it went with them in all their journeys through the wilderness.

The Temple—The Jerusalem Temple

Solomon built the more permanent temple in Jerusalem and 1 Kings 8:10-11 tells us that the glory cloud filled that temple as well.

And when the priests came out of the Holy Place, a cloud filled the house of the Lord, so that the priests could not stand to minister because of the cloud, for the glory of the Lord filled the house of the Lord. (1 Kings 8:10-11 ESV)

The Person of Christ—The Word Becomes Flesh

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. (John 1:14 ESV)

Christ's sinless life, atoning death, and resurrection provide sinners with the gift of righteousness by fulfilling God's commands on behalf of His people. He provides the way for His people to become the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit.

The Body—We Become His Dwelling Place

There is both an individual and a corporate aspect to the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in believers after Pentecost. My body becomes the temple of the Holy Spirit:

Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body. (1 Corinthians 6:19–20 ESV)

In English, "you" can be either singular or plural and it is sometimes difficult to tell unless you are in Alabama where we sometimes say y'all to indicate plural. But in New Testament Greek it is clear. The ESV has a note letting us know that the "you" in 1 Corinthians 3:16–17 is the plural form in the original language. We as the church body are indwelt corporately:

Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy him. For God's temple is holy, and you are that temple. (1 Corinthians 3:16–17 ESV)

And Ephesians tells us that both Jews and Gentiles are being built into one holy temple with Jesus as the cornerstone:

So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone, in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord. In him you also are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit. (Ephesians 2:19–22 ESV)

The New Heavens and New Earth—Our Eternal Home

And, finally, at the culmination of all things, when everything will be as it was intended, Christ will come for His Bride, the Church, and dwell with them forever in the place that Jesus promised while here with His disciples:

"Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also. (John 14:1–3 ESV)

John tells us of the new holy city of Jerusalem where God will dwell with His people and He will Himself wipe away every tear:

And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." (Revelation 21:2–4 ESV)

What a wonderful time we had as over 480 women joined us at this year's Countdown to Christmas! We had a delightful time in fellowship, entertainment, and encouragement from Ashley McMakin to keep our eyes and hearts fixed on the Lord this Christmas and all through the year.


Briarwood Women's Care Team
