Quayle gets a moment in pulpit

Dee Fagin missed her chance to see Vice President Dan Quayle in Washington, D.C. Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., said she was going to miss him so close to home, even if that meant not being at her church, Independent Presbyterian, yesterday.

"I'm a Bush-Quayle supporter and I was very interested to see him," said the nervous 21-year-old Miss Fagin. "I think he's great. I think he's a very family-oriented man and I think we need that."

Miss Fagin was one of many Briarwood Presbyterian churchgoers who waited outside the main sanctuary to witness Dan and Marilyn Quayle and their two sons, Tucker and Benjamin, enter and exit the church.

Quayle attended the 9:20 a.m. service at Briarwood, a 3,700-member conservative Christian church in unincorporated south Washington County near Interstate 495.

The vice president attended Fourth Presbyterian Church in Bethesda, Md., while in day to attend the Talladega Dietrich 500 and close Briarwood Presbyterian at the recommendation of friends.

Briarwood Presbyterian church members and visitors showered Quayle with patriotism and praise.

Elmer Bissell Drive, the entrance road into the \$22 million church complex, was lined with American flags. About 120 American flags were positioned across the entire complex, church administrator Tom Leary said.

At the foot of Elmer Bissell Drive, supporters and opponents of Quayle held signs. Placards such as "Alabama Supports Dan Quayle" or "Just Say No to Mr. Polk" greeted churchgoers as they drove up the hill onto the complex.

But outside the main church sanctuary the crowd was mostly supportive.

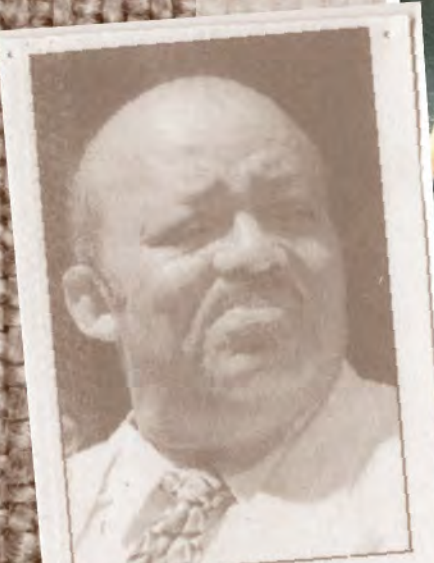
Quayle quotes

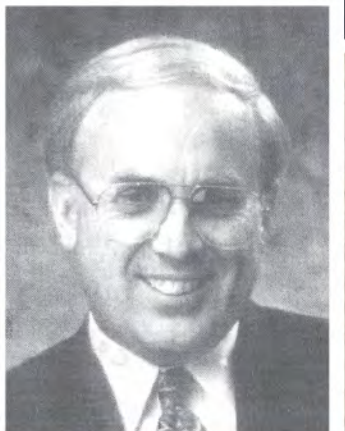

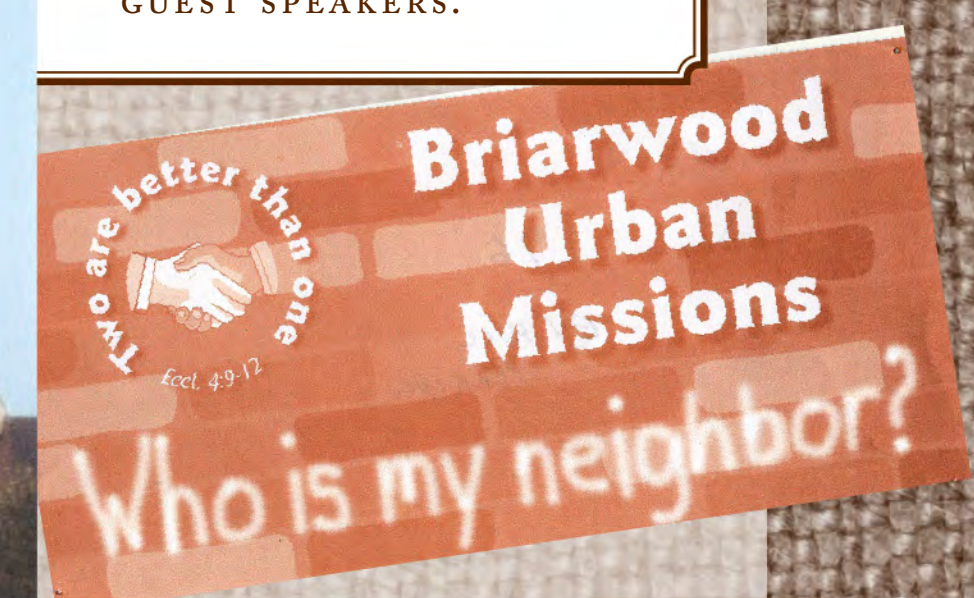
